

GERMANS TO COME FOR CONSERVATION MEETING

DISTINGUISHED VISITORS INVITED BY RICHARD LIEBER.

SCIENTISTS AT NEW YORK

Richard Lieber, chairman of the local board of managers of the national conservation congress, has returned from New York, where he issued an invitation to the members of the German delegation to the international congress of hygiene and demography, at Washington, to attend the congress here October 4. Mr. Lieber expressed himself as pleased with the results of his trip and indications are, he says, that at least seventy-five members of the party will visit Indianapolis.

The delegation arrived in New York harbor Tuesday morning on the Cincinnati and the vessel went into quarantine at 10:30 o'clock. Because of his acquaintance with emigration officials Mr. Lieber was able to obtain their sanction to visit the vessel and greeted members of the party while it was in quarantine. The invitation to come to Indianapolis was received enthusiastically by the members of the party and practically all expressed the desire to visit Indianapolis. Included in the delegation are more than three hundred of the foremost medical men and scientists of Germany.

Acquainted With Many.

Mr. Lieber is personally acquainted with many of the distinguished members of the party. Dr. E. M. Simons, of Berlin, is a lifelong friend; Dr. Lindemann, of Bochum, is an uncle of Mr. Lieber's sister, while Professor Hoffmann, who is accompanied by his wife and daughter, has been the physician of the Lieber family for years. Professor Hoffmann lives at Duesseldorf, and is one of the most learned men in Germany. Other distinguished men in the party include Dr. Oliven, general secretary; Dr. Loewler, who discovered diphtheria bacillus, and Dr. Muellerheim.

It was decided to confer with transportation officials about the matter of making changes in the itinerary of members of the party who desire to come here, and if this can be arranged satisfactorily it is believed many of the members will come here.

Great Interest Shown.

Great interest was shown by members of the delegation in the exhibit presenting the methods employed in the conservation of human life that will be made at the statehouse in connection with the congress. Dr. Winthrop Talbot, of Cleveland, who has active charge of the arrangements for the exhibit, will make an address before the congress at Washington. He also plans to invite visitors at the congress to come to Indianapolis. Dr. Oliven will discuss further the matter of coming to Indianapolis with Dr. J. N. Hurty and H. E. Barnard, of this city, who are attending the congress at Washington.
